Good morning! Families and friends of our 2017 UWC-USA graduates; trustees, volunteers, and donors who have contributed to make their education possible; alumni who today welcome them into their fold; faculty and staff who have engaged and supported them over these two years; and first year students who have learned and lived with them--thank you for being here to share this special occasion.

Class of 2017, in a spirit of gratitude, please join me in a round of applause for all of the people who have supported the success you celebrate today.

Of course the day belongs most especially to you, our UWC-USA Class of 2017. It is a day that marks your hard work and the academic achievement that has come with it.

At this stage in your life, academic success is surely very much on your mind. It anchors your resume. It tells others something about you: how gifted you are in this or that subject, what kind of work ethic you have.

But as UWC graduates, the day marks something more than your academic success, more than anything that can be put on a resume. It is this "something more" that I hope you will reflect on today and take with you.

This "something more" is what we call "the UWC experience". It is quite remarkable if you consider it.

The world is changed one person at a time, one moment at a time. Use your moments wisely: they are the only ones you get. And enjoy this moment. Enjoy it for your individual accomplishment. Enjoy it for what it means to those who have supported you. And enjoy it for what you have contributed as part of something bigger than yourself: this community and its efforts on behalf of a better world.
